Environmentally Speaking...

You Can't Spell "HallowEAn" without "EA"! ...well, you can, if you want to "spell" it right ...

The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection has published new guidance regarding the preparation of the Alternatives Analysis required for certain types of Chapter 105 Water Obstruction and Encroachment Permits. While scary, the new guidelines are more "Treat" than "Trick". This month's article is provided to us by **Courtney Papinchak of NTM Engineering**. (Thank you, Courtney!).

On August 5, 2023, DEP released "Guidance for Developing a Chapter 105 Alternatives Analysis" which can be found here: Chapter 105 Alt Analysis Guidance (state.pa.us). The purpose of the document is to provide guidelines regarding the level of information needed for a Chapter 105 alternatives analysis and for determining if an alternative should be considered practicable, as well as establishing what information is needed by DEP to adequately review Chapter 105 alternative analyses. The policies and procedures outlined in this new guidance document are meant to supplement existing requirements and will not affect regulatory requirements.

An alternatives analysis must be submitted for projects that require a permit under 25 Pa. Code 105.11(a), or as part of a DEP-approved Environmental Assessment where an alternatives analysis is required in the application materials. The alternatives analysis should be consistent with existing policy and guidance including this new guidance document, DEP's EA Form (DEP EA Form (state.pa.us)), and DEP's Comprehensive Environmental Assessment of Proposed Project Impacts for Chapter 105 Water Obstruction and Encroachment Permit Applications (Comprehensive EA (state.pa.us)).

The document provides detailed guidance on common elements that should be incorporated in a Chapter 105 alternatives analysis, including aquatic resource impacts, existing utilities, infrastructure, and easements or ROWs, site constraints, existing technology, stormwater and floodplain management, and environmental and policy considerations. The Department recommends that costs only be included in an alternatives analysis when they are a significant factor in the consideration of alternative locations, routings, or designs, or will aid in the Department's understanding of the alternatives and their practicability.

A section regarding considerations by general project type, which include land development projects, linear utility projects, transportation projects, pollution abatement projects, and restoration and enhancement projects, can also be found in the document. A description of the alternatives analysis process, a template checklist of items to submit to DEP, examples of location and design avoidance and minimization alternatives analysis summary tables, and a list of data resources that may be utilized to investigate project alternatives are also included in the document.

An appendix regarding the differences between NEPA and Chapter 105 alternative analyses is included in the document. The scope of a Chapter 105 alternatives analysis is narrower, focusing only on impacts to aquatic resources. The Chapter 105 alternatives analysis has specific requirements and considerations that may not fully align with the NEPA process. This should be considered by applicants in the alternatives analysis process. That is, an alternatives analysis developed for a NEPA project may be adequate for the Chapter 105 Permit but should be evaluated against PADEP Guidance to ensure adherence to this new guidance.

Overall, the document provides more detail on what is required by DEP for Chapter 105 Alternatives Analysis, exploring considerations and requirements in more depth and providing templates and examples of what to include in a Chapter 105 alternatives analysis.

Donna Prentice Memorial Scholarship Competition - Now Open for Submissions

Our Section's Scholarship Program has been benefitting local college students since 1972. We have had one of the largest such efforts among ASHE Sections nationally over the years. Many recipients have gone on to positions in the industry, both locally and out of the area, and a number have gone on in their professional careers to become members of ASHE.

Last season, applications turned out to be on the lighter side, and the Scholarship Committee was able to recognize 2 students with a total amount of \$6000 being made available for this. In our 2021-22 season there was a total of \$12,000 in awards to 7 students, and we are hopeful that we can get back to that level of participation and applications. We are proud to be able to support our local future engineers and help them in their educational pursuits. The Scholarship Program has assisted numerous students over the years, and was renamed in honor of the late **Donna Prentice**, wife of long-time Section member Rich Prentice, in 2003.

This season's competition is now open, and applications are due by **November 17**. Please check our website for more information on this, as well as the application form (delvalley.ashe.pro). We strongly encourage students to apply (and ask parents to let their college-age children know about this opportunity!).

At our 27th Annual Golf Outing on June 12, the net proceeds, which totaled over \$10,000, will be directed to the Scholarship Fund as in years past.
